

Barbara Seaworth MD, MPH r. Barbara Seaworth received her medical (M.D.) degree from Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri. She completed her residency in Internal Medicine at Wilford Hall United States Air Force Medical Center in San Antonio, Texas and her fellowship in Infectious Disease at Duke University in Durham, North Carolina. Dr. Seaworth is a Professor of Medicine and Infectious Disease at the University of Texas at Tyler Health Science Center.

Dr. Seaworth has spent the last 38 years working with tuberculosis as the Co-Medical Director of the Heartland National TB Center. She is an expert consultant for the state of Texas and for the United States/Mexico Binational Project along the Texas and Mexico border and a clinician for the San Antonio Metro TB Clinic. She is a consultant for the Global TB Concilium. From 2006 - 2022 she was the PI of the CDC grant for the U.S. TB Centers of Excellence. She is a Co-Chair for the Community Research Advisory Group for the CDC's Tuberculosis Trials Consortium.

She is a member of the Union and a past member at large of NAR Council, Fellow of the IDSA, a member of the U.S. National TB Coalition of America and prior President of the National Society of TB Clinicians. She served as a member of the HHSC Advisory Council on the Elimination of TB and IDSA's Global Public Health Committee. She has authored multiple book chapters and publications and has frequently presented on all aspects of tuberculosis internationally and throughout the United States.

Dr. Seaworth views her consultations with other medical providers that contribute to improved patient outcomes, her fight against stigmatizing language, and her support of patient centered care as her most important work and main accomplishments. Her hope is that every patient with TB has not just equal care but equitable care that best fits with their lifestyle and specifics of their disease.

Dr. Seaworth owes her success to the love and encouragement of her family, especially her spouse Dr. John Seaworth along with her children; Dr. Christine Seaworth (Jason Cox), Carrie Seaworth Bach (Andrew Bach), Patrick Seaworth (Dr. Hema Navaneethan Seaworth), Matthew Seaworth, Nathan Seaworth, and Cathleen Seaworth as well as grandchildren Abigail, Bear, Elizabeth, and Collette Bach.

She is thankful for the trust of patients she has been privileged to care for and the caring support and kindness of Dr. Lisa Armitige and her co-workers at the Heartland National TB Center whose assistance has been critical to her success.



lan Kitai мд, мрн an Kitai first encountered tuberculosis when attending medical school at the University of the Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, South Africa. Following internships, he trained for 2 years in pediatrics in the United Kingdom. In 1980 he joined the Oxfam (UK) medical program to newly independent Zimbabwe and worked at a rural former mission hospital for 3 years. From 1983-6 he was senior registrar and lecturer at the University of Zimbabwe. He then undertook further training in Pediatrics and Infectious Diseases at the Hospital for Sick Children (SickKids), Toronto. He also worked for 2 years in Northern Manitoba with the Northern Medical Unit of the University of Manitoba.

For the past 25 years he has been the Tuberculosis Specialist at SickKids and is a Professor in the Department of Pediatrics at the University of Toronto. He also consults in pediatrics and infectious diseases in Ajax, Ontario. In 2003 he served as medical consultant to the infection control department at the Rouge Valley health system hospitals: for his work in preventing SARS transmission to staff and patients he received the Council Award of the College of The Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario.

lan's main interest is in building and maintaining a multidisciplinary team for effective and compassionate patientcentered management. His current research interests include the presentation and diagnosis of pediatric tuberculosis in low burden settings, adverse events including paradoxical reactions during treatment, and the role of VFR travel in pediatric TB. He is an author of many clinical reports, research publications and guidelines including the pediatric chapter of the last 3 editions of the Canadian TB standards. He is the recipient of several teaching awards.

In his career in TB, Ian has been extremely fortunate to work with and learn from several remarkable colleagues. These includeamong many - Dr. Ray Lam (nurse practitioner for the SickKids Tuberculosis Program), Dr. Elizabeth Rea (Toronto Public Health), Colleen Hymers (social work), Professor Simon Schaaf, Drs. Jonathon Campbell MD

onathon is an assistant professor in the Departments of Medicine and Global and Public Health at McGill University in Montreal, Canada, and an associate director of the McGill International TB Centre. Jonathon received his PhD from the University of British Columbia in 2018 and completed a postdoctoral fellowship with Dick Menzies and Kevin Schwartzman at McGill University in 2022. His research centers on generating evidence to inform the design and implementation of novel tuberculosis prevention and care strategies that maximize public health impact, while minimizing health system and patient costs. His research program aims to optimize identification and treatment of tuberculosis infection to prevent progression to tuberculosis disease, with a particular focus on prevention among persons born outside of Canada—a population disproportionately impacted by tuberculosis. He also has an interest in the long-term health of people surviving tuberculosis in high-income settings with a view to improve support and care for this population. He has had the privilege to work alongside national tuberculosis programs, the World Health Organization, and the World Bank on various projects over the years.
